I like history (fiction and non-fiction).










Cody - year 7

Books returned to library after 50 year loan (well almost)...

It is hard to believe that the books pictured – The Heart of the Matter and The Confidential Agent (by Graham Greene) and The Lost Girl (by D.H. Lawrence) - have



found their way back to the library after 49 years. All the books included date labels - one from Inner London Education Authority (ILEA) and two with London County Council (LCC) stamps - still intact!

The earliest recorded return date in the books go back even further - to 1963 (a staggering 59 years!!).

One could only hazard a guess that the reader couldn't part with the books, after reading such great stories or their guilty conscience might have got the better of them!

The books were returned anonymously, so the borrower couldn't be thanked for keeping the books in such good condition nor could they be assured that there would be no fines to pay!

All library books returned, however long overdue, are always gratefully received...
